

This legislative scorecard is designed to let you know where your state legislators stand on a variety of civil rights and civil liberties issues.

We hope you'll use this scorecard to give your legislators feedback on their votes in 2018. Direct communication with your legislators is a valuable way to encourage them to stand up for freedom and protect our constitutional rights.

### SCORECARD METHODOLOGY

#### What to Expect in the Report Card

The ACLU of California Legislative Scorecard reflects votes by members of the California Legislature during 2018 on key legislation regarding the civil liberties and civil rights issues facing Californians. The ACLU of California took a position on every piece of legislation covered by this scorecard. Descriptions of the bills are included in the scorecard. The scorecard shows whether the legislator voted in alignment with the ACLU of California on each bill included in the scorecard. Each legislator also received an overall percentage number representing how well their floor votes aligned with ACLU of California.

#### **How Scores Are Calculated**

Legislators are given 1 point for each bill for which they voted in line with our position on the bill and zero points for voting against our position. A failure to vote on a bill attributable to an absence, as verified by the Daily Journal, was not counted against a member and did not figure into the rating calculations. Abstentions reflect an intentional decision not to vote on the bill, which effectively counts as a vote against the bill.

All legislators are informed about our position prior to voting.

### **BILLS WE SCORED IN 2018**



AB 748 (Ting) Body Worn Cameras for Police Officers: This bill protects the right of the public to access police body camera footage and other recordings that capture incidents involving officer use of force. **Signed.** 

#### AB 2119 (Gloria) Transgender Foster Youth:

Transgender and gender nonconforming (TGNC) youth are overrepresented in California's foster care system. AB 2119 makes clear that child welfare agencies must ensure that they have access to clinicians who provide gender-affirming treatment, consistent with established standards of care. **Signed.** 

AB 2601 (Weber) Sex Education in Charter

Schools: AB 2601 extends sexual health education and HIV prevention education requirements to charter schools, ensuring that charter school students are provided with the same effective, science-based sexual health education as other public school students. **Signed.** 

AB 3080 (Gonzalez Fletcher) Remedies for Victims of Sexual Harassment: Forced arbitration of sexual harassment and other discrimination claims is a serious impediment to addressing the problems highlighted by the #metoo movement. AB 3080 would have promoted consent and fairness before important workplace rights could be waived, and prevented employers from requiring workers to sign non-disclosure contracts as a condition of employment. **Vetoed.** 

#### AB 3131 (Gloria & Chiu) Police Militarization:

AB 3131 would have empowered communities to weigh in on how their neighborhoods are policed by requiring that law enforcement agencies propose and publish guidelines for the use of military equipment, and report how, where, and why that equipment is deployed in our communities. **Vetoed.** 

SB 244 (Lara) Personal Information Protection for Immigrants: SB 244 ensures that immigrants can make use of specific programs that provide driver's licenses, municipal IDs, and healthcare without fear by protecting sensitive personal information from unnecessary disclosure. Signed.

SB 320 (Leyva) Access to Abortion: SB 320 would have increased access to reproductive health services for students attending public universities by providing medication abortions on campus at student health centers. Currently, students seeking this basic health care must travel off-campus and often to another county – a serious logistical and financial barrier. **Vetoed.** 

SB 607 (Skinner) Student Discipline: Students of color, as well as students with disabilities and LGBTQ students, are disproportionally suspended in California for minor misbehavior under the vague and subjective categories of "disruption" and "willful defiance." SB 607 would have eliminated these discriminatory suspensions for students in grades 4-8, encouraging schools to find alternatives to keep students in the classroom where they belong. **Vetoed.** 

SB 822 (Wiener) Net Neutrality: SB 822 restores to Californians the protections lost when Pres. Trump's administration overturned the Open Internet Order. A free and open Internet is not only a matter of consumer protection—it is also vital to free speech and allows marginalized voices to use the Internet to build communities and create societal change. Signed.

SB 923 (Wiener) Eyewitness Identification Reform: By establishing long-overdue state standards requiring best practices for eyewitness identification procedures, SB 923 helps protect the integrity of our justice system and promotes the safety and wellbeing of our communities by preventing wrongful convictions. Signed.

SB 1194 (Lara) Hotel Guest Information: SB 1194 protects the confidentiality of hotel guests and bus company passengers' information to ensure immigrants and other travelers in California don't have their personal information turned over to federal immigration agents or others without a court order or warrant. Signed.

SB 1393 (Mitchell) Sentencing Enhancements: SB 1393 increases the fairness of our justice system by restoring court discretion, in the interest of justice, to strike the five-year sentence enhancement for prior serious felony convictions, when a person is charged with a serious felony. **Signed.** 

SB 1421 (Skinner) Access to Police Misconduct & Use of Force Records: SB 1421 reclaims the public's right to know about cases of serious police misconduct and deadly uses of force. SB 1421 provides public access to internal police department investigations into officers found guilty of sexual assault, perjury or planting evidence, and officers who shoot, severely injure, or kill a member of the public. Signed.
